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

Shaul and Furbee (1998)	Languages and cultures are systematic to a large degree, and are thus observable and describable. These authors added that whereas the systematic description of language is called linguistics, the description of cultures is called ethnography .
ArdilaRey (2008)	Language and culture are inextricably linked with each other.

Teachniques and strategies for teaching culture experiences in class 1. Techniques



- ✓ The role of literature and humanities: watching film, literary reading
- ✓ Creating an authentic classroom environment : display and exhibitions of realia, photos, printed materials....
- \checkmark Behavioural and affective aspects :drama and mini- drama
- \checkmark Real- life exposure to the target culture: native speaker visits the class

2. Strategies

Cullen, 2002 shows some strategies which can be implemented in the classroom. Teachers should make use of a combination of materials in order to help learners choose the right learning style that would suit them best

Video, CDs, TV, the Internet, stories, songs, realia, guest speakers, surveys, anecdotes, photographs, illustrations, literature




Figure 1: The comparability of the control and experimental groups




Figure 2: The result pre-test, post- test of the experimental groups





V. Conclusion

- It is clear from the above discussion that cultural experiences are interwoven so that cannot separate the two without losing the significane of either language or culture.
- It is observed that most students find cultural experiences motivating, however, a few students are not easy to correspond with native teacher or in real life situations. This might be the result of learning English without proper awareness of its culture. Thus, the role of cultural experiences can't be avoided while designing lessons for EFL learners.
- Using techniques and stratergies effectively requires that teachers should set clear objectives as well as consider what to teach to who and when. If teachers constantly monitor their classes and adjust to what they do, there is a really good chance that the methods and techniques they use will be the best(Harmer, 2001: 97)
