How to run a SOLE session

- 1. Set up a room with some computers and other materials the students might need.
- 2. Form initial groups of 3-5.
- 3. Pose a "Big Question" to the students.
- 4. Allow the students to self organize and answer the question as they see fit. (That's the hard part!)
- 5. Students present their findings.
- 6. Feedback.

Timing

Depends on many factors:

eg. 5-minutes greetings and introduction of Big Question

60-minutes SOLE

25-minutes presentations and feedback

Agree on "lesson plan"



Possible pitfalls

- Connection issues
- AV issues, audio feedback
- Students don't know what to do
