What is the






- Online collaboration for English language learners
- 29 countries/regions have participated since 2015
- 7,000+ participants in 2023; 5,000+ in 2024
- Funded by Japanese Gov't Kaken grant & Participant donations
- Primarily text-based interactions
- Participants share info about various topics









- Participants chose topic & added posts / replies
- Others responded and the conversations continued
- Could add images, videos, music, etc. in posts
- Part of my students' grades: 15% of final grade
 - Based on # of posts / replies;
 - # of words
 - max engagement level (multiple interactions with the same person)

Study Participants

101 Japanese university English majors (3 cohorts: 2022~2024)

2 semesters participating in IVEProject

Informed Consent obtained from all

8-week project sessions

Posted / replied during class (10 mins) & for homework

Encouraged to continue conversations with same people over time



Assessing students' performance

Final performance data downloaded from IVEProject website and analyzed in Excel

RQ: Did experience effect performance in the IVEProject?

The following students' data were observed:


- Total # of posts and replies
- # of words written
- Maximum engagement achieved
 (Engagement = interactions with same person)




Results

Comparing total # of posts & replies across 2 semesters of participation


2022 (n=41)

2024 (n=34)






2022 (n=41) ■ Spring ■ Fall


Spring 2 Fall 39






Discussion about Trends in Students' Participation

RE: # of posts & replies

2022, 2023 & 2024 saw increases in # of posts & replies in Fall Semester

2023 data was less differentiated (11 of 26 wrote more in spring)

Generally, students posted more in Fall Semester, so, experience with participation may have encouraged more interactions



Average # of posts / replies

2024	19 (15)	32 (29)		

Note: In 2024, 1 student wrote 150 posts in spring & 126 posts in fall—avg. in parentheses excludes this student's data. 2 other students posted 158 and 175 times in fall semester, so those students' data may skew results. Excluding these results still resulted in increased fall semester participation.

Discussion about Trends in Students' Participation

RE: # of words written

2022 & 2024 saw increases in # of words written in Fall Semester

2023 was evenly split

Generally, students wrote more in Fall Semester, so, experience with participation may have encouraged more language production



Average words written

	Spring	Fall
2022	403	1547
2023	1001	1091
2024	1372 (859)	1909 (1520)

Note: In 2024, 1 student wrote 18,286 words in spring & 14,759 words in fall—avg. in parentheses excludes this student's data. 2 other students wrote 5,827 words and 6847 words in fall semester, so those students' data may skew results. Excluding these results still resulted in increased fall semester participation.

Discussion about Trends in Students' Participation

RE: Engagement levels

2022 & 2024 saw increases in engagement level in Fall Semester 2023 was evenly split

Generally, students engaged more with the same partners than spring semester, so, experience with participation may have encouraged more sustained engagements



Engagement Levels Achieved Spring Fall

Increased number of words written on average in fall semesters shows motivation to use more language





Increases in the max engagement levels in fall semesters shows more motivation to interact longer



Overall, having experience in online intercultural collaborations leads to better engagement
